

1 **MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING** of the City Council of the City of Orange City, Florida,
2 held on Tuesday, January 11, 2011 at 7:00 p.m. in Council Chambers, 201 N. Holly Avenue, Orange
3 City.

4
5 **CALL TO ORDER**

6
7 The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by Mayor Strickland and roll call was taken.

8
9 **ROLL CALL**

10
11 **PRESENT:** Mayor Harley Strickland; Vice Mayor O. William (Bill) Crippen; Council Members Jeff
12 Allebach, Tom Abraham, Anthony J. Pupello, Tom Laputka; City Attorney William Reischmann; City
13 Manager Jamie Croteau; City Clerk Deborah Renner

14
15 **ABSENT:** Council Member Gary A. Blair

16
17 Ms Croteau noted that Council Member Blair requested a discussion of the alleys in Orange City. This
18 is on the agenda as Item 8A, however, due to Council Member Blair's absence, Ms. Croteau requested
19 that it be continued to the next meeting.

20
21 **INVOCATION**

22
23 The Invocation was given by Barry Greening, Assistant Pastor, Volusia County Baptist Church,
24 followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

25
26 **1. ABSENCES:** None at this time.

27
28 **2. PRESENTATIONS/PROCLAMATIONS:** None at this time.

29
30 **3. CITIZENS COMMENTS:**

31
32 Gina Holmes, Sustainable Water Committee, came forward and thanked the Council for their actions
33 regarding the Seth French house. Ms. Holmes said membership on the Sustainable Water Committee
34 has fallen and the Committee wishes to advertise a meeting to be held in February at the Manatee
35 Festival. In addition, the Committee is requesting \$100 to provide refreshments at that meeting. Ms.
36 Holmes requested that the alternative water fee for people using 3,000 gallons or less of water a month
37 be removed.

38
39 Ms. Croteau advised that the alternative water fee is not applied on customers using under 6,000 gallons
40 of water. She said the Utility recently sold surplus meters and could fund the \$100 the Water
41 Committee is requesting.

42
43 **It was the consensus of the City Council to donate \$100 to the Sustainable Water**
44 **Committee for refreshments at their next meeting.**

4 **Council Member Allebach moved to approve the Consent Agenda, seconded by Vice**
 5 **Mayor Crippen and passed by a unanimous 6/0 roll call vote of the Council.**

7 **5. ORDINANCES – FIRST READING:**

8

9 **A. ORDINANCE NO. 447:** An ordinance of the City of Orange City, Florida,
 10 annexing the Senez property into the corporate limits of the City of Orange
 11 City, Florida; said property being generally located on the west side of North
 12 Volusia Avenue, approximately 600 feet south of West Minnesota Avenue,
 13 containing approximately 9.35 acres; in accordance with the voluntary
 14 annexation provisions of Florida Statute 171.044; redefining the boundaries
 15 of the City of Orange City by amending the appropriate sections of the code
 16 of ordinances; containing a repealer provision, a severability clause and
 17 providing for an effective date.

18

19 Council Member Allebach read the title of Ordinance No. 447 into the record.

20

21 **Council Member Laputka moved to adopt Ordinance No. 447 on first**
 22 **reading, seconded by Vice Mayor Crippen.**

23

24 Jim Kerr, City Planner came forward and advised the Senez property at 2235 N Volusia Avenue is
 25 approximately 9.5 acres located 600 ft south of West Minnesota Ave. He said the property is contiguous
 26 to the City limits and meets the criteria for State statutes for voluntary annexation. Staff recommends
 27 Council adopt Ordinance No. 447 annexing this property into the City limits.

28

29 **Motion passed by a 6/0 roll call vote of the Council.**

30

31 **B. ORDINANCE NO. 449:** An ordinance of the City of Orange City, Florida,
 32 extending a temporary moratorium for an additional ninety (90) days on the
 33 issuance of any business tax license, permit, conditional use approval, site
 34 plan approval, and any other official action of the City of Orange City having
 35 the effect of permitting or allowing construction and/or operations of certain
 36 businesses within the City of Orange City, related to game rooms, arcades,
 37 internet cafes, sweepstakes redemption centers, establishments using slot
 38 machines or slot machine like equipment and similar indoor entertainment
 39 and amusement activities as more specifically described in this ordinance,
 40 excluding approvals and permits for the continuance of an existing business;
 41 the temporary moratorium shall apply to all real property located within the
 42 corporate limits of the City of Orange City; providing for conflicting
 43 provisions; providing for severability, conflicts and an effective date.

44

45 Council Member Allebach read the title of Ordinance No. 449 into the record.

46

47 **Council Member Laputka moved to adopt Ordinance No. 449 on first**
 48 **reading, seconded by Vice Mayor Crippen.**

1 Council Member Laputka acknowledged that other cities are taking similar legislative action and
2 questioned if there were any challenges. Mr. Reischmann responded in the negative. He said local
3 governments are still struggling to determine the most efficient way to regulate these businesses.
4 Extending the moratorium is allowable for a defined period of time and with acceptable rationale. In
5 addition staff will have more time to find the best way to protect the citizens and the City from illegal
6 gambling establishments opening.

7
8 **Motion passed by a 6/0 roll call vote of the Council.**

9
10 **6. PUBLIC HEARINGS:**

12 **A. ORDINANCE NO. 444:** An ordinance of the City of Orange City, Volusia County,
13 Florida; amending Orange City Code Appendix A, Zoning Ordinance, as adopted by
14 Ordinance No. 157, amending Section 8.6.1 Schedule of Zoning Districts Permitted and
15 Conditional Uses; containing a repealer provision, severability clause, and providing for
16 an effective date.

17
18 Council Member Allebach read the title of Ordinance No. 444 into the record.

19
20 **Council Member Laputka moved to adopt Ordinance No. 444 on**
21 **second and final reading, seconded by Vice Mayor Crippen.**

22
23 Wendy Hickey, Planning & Zoning Analyst came forward and said there have been no changes since the
24 first reading of this ordinance.

25
26 Mayor Strickland opened the public hearing by asking if anyone wanted to speak for or against the
27 proposed ordinance, no one appeared. The mayor closed the public hearing.

28
29 **Motion passed by a 4/2 roll call vote of the Council, with Council**
30 **Members Allebach and Pupello voting “no.”**

32 **B. ORDINANCE NO. 445:** An ordinance of the City of Orange City, Florida,
33 annexing the Pantry property into the Corporate Limits of the City of Orange
34 City, Florida; said property being generally located on the west side of North
35 Volusia Avenue, approximately 0.0 feet north of West New York Avenue,
36 containing approximately 1.55 acres; in accordance with the voluntary
37 annexation provisions of Florida Statute 171-044; redefining the boundaries of
38 the City of Orange City by amending the appropriate sections of the Code of
39 Ordinances; containing a repealer provision, a severability clause, and
40 providing for an effective date.

41
42 Council Member Allebach read the title of Ordinance No. 445 into the record.

43
44 **Council Member Laputka moved to adopt Ordinance No. 445 on second**
45 **and final reading, seconded by Vice Mayor Crippen.**

46
47 Mr. Kerr said there have been no changes since first reading.

48

1 Mayor Strickland opened the public hearing by asking if anyone wanted to speak for or against the
2 proposed ordinance, no one appeared. The mayor closed the public hearing.

3
4 **Motion passed by a 6/0 roll call vote of the Council.**

6 **C. ORDINANCE NO. 446:** An ordinance of the City Council of the City of
7 Orange City, Florida, amending Chapter 10.5 Leisure Services, Article II Use
8 Restrictions, Section 10.5-19 Rules and Regulations, of the Code of
9 Ordinances of the City of Orange City, by revising sub-sections (1), and (11),
10 and adding sub-sections (19) and (20); containing a repealer provision, a
11 severability clause and providing for an effective date

12
13 Council Member Allebach read the title of Ordinance No. 446 into the record.

14
15 **Council Member Laputka moved to adopt Ordinance No. 446 on second**
16 **and final reading, seconded by Vice Mayor Crippen**

17
18 Christine Davis, Finance Director came forward and said there have been no changes since first reading.

19
20 Mayor Strickland opened the public hearing by asking if anyone wanted to speak for or against the
21 proposed ordinance, no one appeared. The mayor closed the public hearing.

22
23 **Motion passed by a 6/0 roll call vote of the Council.**

24
25 **7. RESOLUTIONS:**

- 26
27 **A. RESOLUTION NO. 628-10:** A resolution of the City Council of the City of
28 Orange City, Florida, acknowledging and approving a third 12-month
29 extension to the preliminary subdivision plat for the Lansdowne Oaks
30 Subdivision, with the intent to divide a 5.0 acre parcel and a 10.0 acre parcel
31 into 35 proposed residential lots, said parcels located on East Lansdowne
32 Avenue, Orange City, Florida; repealing all resolutions or parts of resolutions
33 in conflict herewith; and providing for an effective date.

34
35 Council Member Allebach read the title of Resolution No. 628-10 into the record.

36
37 **Council Member Laputka moved to approve Resolution No. 628-10,**
38 **seconded by Vice Mayor Crippen.**

39
40 Mr. Kerr noted this presentation applies to agenda items 7A- Preliminary Subdivision Plat and 7B- Site
41 Plan for Lansdowne Oaks. He said the applicant is requesting his third 12-month extension to these
42 development orders. Referring to a PowerPoint presentation (a copy of which is attached and becomes a
43 permanent part of these minutes) he noted the location of the subdivision. He said it consists of 5 and 10
44 acre lots on East Lansdowne Avenue. The developer anticipates subdividing the property into 35 ¼-acre
45 residential lots with underground utilities, a mail kiosk, paved roads, sidewalks, streetlights and treed
46 landscape. Mr. Kerr said staff is recommending Council approve a 12-month extension of the
47 preliminary subdivision plat and a 12-month extension to the site plan subject to 8 conditions. He
48 discussed the conditions noting that conditions 7 and 8 were recently modified.

1 In response to a question from Council Member Laputka, Ms. Stettner said that staff negotiated
2 conditions 7 and 8 with the developer. Ms. Croteau explained that several citizens expressed concerns
3 about the proposed subdivision, staff incorporated those concerns into the development order.
4

5 Henry Durica, 1310 E. Lansdowne Ave. came forward and thanked Ms. Stettner for her help with
6 initiating the changes.
7

8 **Motion passed by a 6/0 roll call vote of the Council.**
9

- 10 **B. RESOLUTION NO. 629-10:** A resolution of the City Council of the City of
11 Orange City, Florida, acknowledging and approving a third 12-month
12 extension to the site plan for the Lansdowne Oaks subdivision, said site plan
13 containing the specifications to divide a 5.0 acre parcel and a 10.0 acre parcel
14 into 35 proposed residential lots, said parcels located on East Lansdowne
15 Avenue, Orange City, Florida; repealing all resolutions or parts of resolutions
16 in conflict herewith; and providing for an effective date.
17

18 As a point of order Council Member Allebach questioned whether the motion must mention the two
19 conditions added to the development order. Mr. Reischmann advised that is not required as the
20 conditions are a part of the development order.
21

22 Council Member Allebach read the title of Resolution No. 629-10 into the record.
23

24 **Council Member Laputka moved to approve Resolution No. 629-10,**
25 **seconded by Vice Mayor Crippen.**
26

27 Vice Mayor Crippen noted that the last time this development order was extended he was aware of the
28 concerns citizens had with regard to the project. He thanked Ms. Stettner for her efforts in getting those
29 concerns addressed.
30

31 **Motion passed by a 6/0 roll call vote of the Council.**
32

- 33 **C. RESOLUTION NO. 630-10:** A resolution of the City Council of the City of
34 Orange City, adopting a revised fee schedule for development review to
35 establish a fee for special event permits; providing for conflicts; providing for
36 severability; and providing an effective date.
37

38 Council Member Allebach read the title of Resolution No. 630-10 into the record.
39

40 **Council Member Laputka moved to approve Resolution No. 630-10,**
41 **seconded by Vice Mayor Crippen.**
42

43 In response to a question from Council Member Laputka, Ms. Stettner explained that Exhibit A is the
44 fee schedule for all development review fees. The special events permit fee was added and is depicted
45 by an underline.
46

47 **Motion passed by a 6/0 roll call vote of the Council.**
48

- 49 **D. RESOLUTION 631-10:** A resolution of the City Council of the City of

1 Orange City, Florida, recognizing and confirming legislation in progress
2 regarding the extension of a moratorium on the establishment and/or operation
3 of internet cafes in Orange City; repealing all resolutions or parts of
4 resolutions in conflict herewith and providing for severability and an effective
5 date.

6
7 Council Member Allebach read the title of Resolution No. 631-10 into the record.
8

9 **Council Member Laputka moved to approve Resolution No. 631-10,**
10 **seconded by Vice Mayor Crippen.**

11
12 Mr. Reischmann advised that this resolution works in conjunction with Ordinance No. 449 and is
13 required to bridge the gap between the original 180 day moratorium and the extension in process. He
14 said it is a court recognized legal process for legislations in process.
15

16 **Motion passed by a 6/0 roll call vote of the Council.**

17
18 **8. DISCUSSION AND ACTION:**

- 19
20 A. Discussion of Alleys in Orange City (*Continued to next meeting*)
21
22 B. Discussion Regarding Bus Benches
23

24 Mr. Kerr came forward to provide a report on the location of bus shelters and benches in the City. He
25 displayed a PowerPoint presentation (a copy of which is attached and becomes a permanent part of these
26 minutes) and noted that Voltran operates the public transit system in Volusia County and establishes bus
27 routes and stops. Cities within the County are responsible for providing bus shelters and benches based
28 on a "warranted" criterion. He detailed the criteria and stated an inventory of the bus stops in the City's
29 planning area showed a total of 60 bus stops, 14 bus benches and 7 bus shelters. Currently, two benches
30 and a shelter are warranted at Ohio Avenue and U.S. 17-92. Several cities contract with vendors to
31 install benches with advertising at no cost, while others fund their own bench and shelter installations;
32 however, at the present time Orange City does neither. Several advertising companies contracted with
33 the County to install benches with advertising throughout the City and those benches are in violation of
34 the Land Development Code. He displayed photos of the benches and explained that off-premise signs
35 and signs in the right-of-ways are prohibited and that a permit is required. Mr. Kerr discussed the
36 various options available to correct the problem. He concluded by stating staff is recommending criteria
37 be established to install bus benches without signs when warranted, and that the benches and shelter that
38 are warranted be installed at the locations discussed. In addition, staff is recommending the removal of
39 the 14 benches that are in violation of the Code.
40

41 Council Member Laputka observed many of the benches are placed in the right-of-way and are too
42 dangerous for public use. He asked if staff's recommendation will help solve that problem. Mr. Kerr
43 responded in the affirmative. He said the benches would be removed and the new benches installed
44 must meet the City's requirements.
45

46 Mayor Strickland noted that advertising on the bus benches is a way to generate additional revenue for
47 the City. Mr. Reischmann pointed out that under the existing code, advertising on bus benches is
48 considered an off-site sign and is not allowable. He cautioned that amending the Code to allow off-site
49 signage may open the door for "unintended consequences."

1 Council Member Abraham asked what the trends in larger cities are. Ms. Stettner responded there are a
2 number of viewpoints on signage for transit stations. She discussed the various types of signs that could
3 be installed and stated her opinion the City is not "transit ready" enough to accept those types of
4 solutions. She discussed the factors staff will consider when determining criteria for the type and
5 placement of bus benches.

6
7 Council Member Allebach said he is not concerned with the advertising on the benches. The companies
8 that install the benches maintain the area by picking up the trash. He said he wants a quick resolution
9 because removing the benches would create discontentment among the people who ride the buses and
10 who use the benches. He said if the benches are removed, the City must have an alternative in the place.
11 He noted that if the City were to provide benches with advertising signs, the City could not control what
12 is said on the signs due to the freedom of speech laws. Council Member Allebach said that he would
13 like to see garbage cans at each bus stop.

14
15 Mayor Strickland suggested the city consider benches that are smaller and difficult for the homeless
16 population to sleep on. He said he would like to see benches that compliment the look of the City as
17 well as providing for the people who use the buses, and that the benches not be installed in the rights-of-
18 ways.

19
20 Council Member Abraham felt that Option 3 is the best option for the City. Vice Mayor Crippen said he
21 agrees with Council Member Allebach's comments. He suggested the City could contract with a vendor
22 and put conditions on the type of advertising the vendor would put on the benches. He stated that would
23 be an ideal public/private venture that would accomplish what the City is trying to accomplish.

24
25 Council Member Pupello expressed his opinion that Option is 4 is the only viable option that will allow
26 the City to control the look of the City and prevent placement of the benches in the right-of-ways. He
27 suggested that the maintenance costs are worth it. He agreed with the Mayor's comments about people
28 sleeping on the benches and said other cities have a center arm rest to prevent that. He agreed that
29 garbage cans at each bus stop are required. Council Member Pupello questioned who will pay for the
30 removal of the benches. Ms. Croteau advised the companies that installed the benches must remove
31 them as they were installed without a permit. She stated this is an opportunity for Council to define
32 what the City is going to look like. The advertising benches are against the Code, and are classified as
33 "visual pollution."

34
35 Council Member Pupello suggested that it is important for staff to continue working with Votran and to
36 monitor the "warranted" criteria for the placement of bus benches and shelters as that will provide a
37 better understanding of the transit needs in the City. He said he agrees with removing the "illegal
38 billboards" on the bus benches because they are unsafe and contribute to blight. Council Member
39 Pupello suggested that the City could use the bus shelters as an opportunity to advertise upcoming City
40 events.

41
42 In response to a question from Mayor Strickland, Ms. Croteau said that staff would install the benches.
43 Staff will bring forward a recommendation based on the criteria for Option 4. She reminded Council the
44 City is currently working on a community redevelopment area along U.S. 17-92 including a
45 streetscaping package that could include the bus benches, bus shelters and trash receptacles. The
46 proposed benches are similar to what is already in the historic areas of the City and the parks. Ms.
47 Croteau said \$100,000 for community improvement is in the budget. Originally the money was to be
48 used for the Seth French House, but it could be used for this project.

1 Council Member Allebach stated that it is important to note that more than two benches are required to
2 fix the problem.

3
4 **9. NEW BUSINESS:**

5
6 Vice Mayor Crippen said that he would like to see a discussion on garbage recycling education.

7
8 Council Member Laputka said he would like to see a discussion on “pocket parks.”

9
10 **10. REPORTS:**

11
12 A. City Manager

13
14 Ms. Croteau reminded Council the City offices will be closed on January 17th in observance of the
15 Martin Luther King holiday. Ms. Croteau said the City has made its payment to Team Volusia, the
16 contract is for 3 years, but can be cancelled at any time. Ms. Croteau said she met with Emerald Waste
17 Services (EWS) about recycling and that EWS will work with the City on a recycling education
18 program.

19
20 Ms. Croteau asked Police Chief Frank Ross to come forward. She said Chief Ross’ contract is up
21 tomorrow. She presented him with a plaque, thanking him for coming to the City at a time when the
22 Police Department was in turmoil. She said he has done an outstanding job in “calming the waters” and
23 in bringing professionalism to the Police Department. A farewell celebration is planned for tomorrow at
24 3 p.m. in Council Chambers. Council Member Laputka read a proclamation into the record publicly
25 acknowledging and thanking Frank Ross for sharing his time, expertise and knowledge with staff and
26 citizens of the City.

27
28 Chief Ross gave his parting words. He said this was a “wonderful opportunity” to meet new associates
29 and that he, too, has learned through his interaction with the police officers. He expressed his personal
30 appreciation to Council for the opportunity to serve the Orange City community and for creating an
31 environment for the police officers. Chief Ross thanked Ms. Croteau and Commander Thomas for their
32 support. In conclusion, Chief Ross stated, “any successes that we have experienced are attributed to the
33 men and women of the Police Department.”

34
35 Ms. Croteau announced that Commander Pete Thomas will take over as the new Chief of Police. She
36 said Commander Thomas has been with the City since 1991. He recently completed the Southern
37 Institute Administrative Officer’s Training Program. She said Commander Thomas will be sworn in as
38 Police Chief at the next City Council meeting.

39
40 B. Mayor/City Council

41
42 Council Member Allebach said the executive board of Volusia League of Cities met today. The next
43 league dinner will be on January 27th in South Daytona. The new executive director for Team Volusia
44 will present the educational training program and will talk about developing a strategic plan.

45
46 Council Member Laputka announced that he will be leaving early tomorrow to go to Tallahassee for a
47 Senate Budget Hearing to comment on some of the water mandates handed down by Tallahassee. He
48 said he will be accompanied by Council Member Abraham and Michael Wright from the Sustainable
49 Water Committee.

1 Mayor Strickland discussed continuing issues regarding consolidation of fire services. He said it will be
2 on the agenda for the Summit meeting. TABOR is another major issue that will be on the agenda as
3 well. He explained TABOR legislation will put a cap on expenditures and revenue for local
4 governments. Mayor Strickland said this legislation is coming from the Senate and urged everyone to
5 contact their Senator to express your opposition to this legislation.

6
7 C. City Clerk

8
9 Ms. Renner reminded Council the City will have a booth at the Manatee Festival. She said she will pass
10 around a schedule for any Council Member that would like to help staff the booth. Ms. Renner advised
11 that the windows for the Clerk's office will be replaced shortly. She said a new computer for the office
12 is on its way. Ms. Renner said she will be meeting with the imaging software representative next week.
13 Council Member Allebach stated the imaging software will provide greater transparency because the
14 Clerk's office will have the capability to image and make available all city documents quickly.

15
16 D. City Attorney

17
18 No further report.

20 **11. APPROVAL OF MINUTES** (*See Consent Agenda*)

21
22 **12. COUNCIL COMMENTS:**

23
24 Council Member Abraham said that he will be making a DVD of the proceeding in Tallahassee. He said
25 he will make a copy for Council. Council Member Abraham said he went to the City of Apopka and
26 spoke at their first commission meeting of the year.

27
28 Vice Mayor Crippen wished everyone a good time and success in Tallahassee. Vice Mayor Crippen
29 said visitors who visited his business have commented that Orange City is the nicest little town in
30 Florida. He said he hopes the community redevelopment area is up and running soon so the City can get
31 its reputation going for being a good place to live.

32
33 Mayor Strickland reminded Council about the small group meetings he held with the local business
34 owners. He said he promised to meet with them in a larger group setting and that he has scheduled a
35 meeting for January 20th. He asked Council Members for their help in encouraging them to attend. It
36 will be an informational meeting to discuss the community redevelopment project, development issues
37 about U.S. 17-92 and several other issues that will affect the business owners. He distributed copies of
38 the letter inviting participants (a copy of which is attached and becomes a permanent part of these
39 minutes). He invited Council Members to attend but asked that there be no discussion on city business
40 to avoid violations of the Sunshine laws. Mr. Reischmann advised that the City Clerk notice the
41 meeting.

42
43 Council Member Allebach discussed the various activities planned for the Manatee Festival. He said
44 Channel 13 will have a blimp at the Manatee Festival; a helicopter involved with manatee rescues and
45 the Central Florida Zoo will be present as well. Council Member Allebach said that he read an article in
46 the newspaper about someone filing a lawsuit against police officers for the use of excess force because
47 the police officers shot at him while he was trying to run them down with his car. Addressing the Police
48 Officers present, Council Member Allebach stated, "I'd rather go to a criminal's funeral than yours,

1 shoot away.” Referencing comments about fire service consolidation, Council Member Allebach stated,
2 “Consolidation is not going to happen on my watch.”

3
4 Council Member Pupello thanked the citizens who were present he said he would like to see more come
5 to the meeting. He asked everyone present to invite their neighbor to the next meeting. Council
6 Member Pupello said he sees the City becoming more professional. He stated, “I believe that we are
7 heading in the right direction.”

8
9 Council Member Laputka said he agrees with Council Member Pupello’s comments. He noted the
10 attendance at the goal setting workshops was the highest turnout ever and said he would like to replicate
11 that this year. Council Member Laputka said he picked up a community newspaper new to the area. He
12 said he observed 19 events in the tri-city area for January and that Orange City has just one. He said he
13 would like to see more City sponsored events. Council Member Laputka announced that on Saturday
14 there will be a free concert with the “Kings Brass” at the Volusia County Baptist Church. He invited
15 everyone to come.

16
17 Mayor Strickland echoed the comments with regard to attendance. He said when he started three years,
18 he wanted to tell some jokes and have some fun. Mayor Strickland he would like to leave everyone with
19 a little puzzle to figure out. He stated, “My puzzle for you is to see what you can find out about “hacker
